






Key Assumptions:

- Opening 2035
- Length: 5.4 miles
- Three elevated stations: Ballard, Interbay, Smith Cove
- Two tunnel stations: Seattle Center, South Lake Union
- New rail-only movable bridge over Salmon Bay
- Peak headways: 6 minutes
- Daily Projected Riders: 47,000 57,000



Downtown Tunnel



Key Assumptions:

- Opening 2035
- Length: 1.7 miles
- Four tunnel stations: Denny, Westlake, Midtown, International District/Chinatown
- Peak headways: 6 minutes
- Daily Projected Riders: 110,000 136,000



West Seattle to Downtown



Key Assumptions:

- Opening 2030
- Length: 4.7 miles
- One at-grade station: Stadium
- Four elevated stations: SODO, Delridge, Avalon, Alaska Junction
- High-level rail-only fixed span crossing of the Duwamish River
- Peak headways: 6 minutes
- Daily Projected Riders: 32,000 37,000


